

Additional Information
April 9, 2019 Board Meeting

The following additional information was provided regarding the April 9 Board meeting agenda:

Item 3.a, Purchase Order Listing:

1. P0130561: May I have some context on UCI's Baja Conference? **It is a five-day dance conference. Fullerton College students take master classes, perform, and choreograph pieces that are adjudicated by professionals in the industry. In this conference, four-year colleges and universities recruit community college students to transfer.**
2. P0130565: American Welding Society, \$12,000 from Library Digital Reference Manual? Is that correct? **Yes, this is a one-year online subscription for the American Welding Society Standards. It allows up to 50 students to visit it at the same time.**
3. P0130648: What are the meal cards referenced in this PO? **EOPS students who experience food insecurity have the opportunity to have a nutritious meal while on campus with the Sodexo meal card. As part of its program mission, EOPS offers students over-and-above services to help them in their endeavors to be successful students. This is a Title V approved expenditure.**
4. The food vouchers from Sodexo, are those being used for students who are food insecure? **Yes, EOPS students who experience food insecurity have the opportunity to have a nutritious meal while on campus with the Sodexo meal card. As part of its program mission, EOPS offers students over-and-above services to help them in their endeavors to be successful students. This is a Title V approved expenditure.**

Item 3.b, Budget Adjustments and New Grants:

1. Do we partner with the County of Orange for mental health support? **The mental health support funding received from the state is contingent upon facilitating the following activities: to support activities, including but not limited to, expanding mental health services, providing training, and developing stronger relationships with the county behavioral health department and community-based mental health services for which reimbursement is available through the students' health coverage.**
 - **At Fullerton College Health Services has a good relationship with the Orange County Health Care Agency. They refer students to the following services: Crisis Assessment Team (CAT) to evaluate student at risk for harm to self or others, requiring possible Psychiatric Hospitalization; County contracted crisis line; Veteran Service Office (VSO) behavioral health and benefits services for Military Veterans that do not qualify for Veteran Administration's benefits due to negative discharge disposition; Alcohol and Drug Abuse Services for students without insurance; Outpatient follow up for adult psychiatric care and other mental health services for students without insurance; Young Adults – Mental health program (ages 18 -25); Post psychiatric hospitalization outpatient follow up services; and, County outpatient clinics for students without insurance requiring medications intervention.**

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- NOCE is planning on using the Mental Health Allocation to provide additional services to the students attending the Anaheim Food Pantry once it is in place and to supplement the current CAEP mental health strategy.
 - Cypress College utilizes Orange County Health Care Agency (OCHCA) services and has a strong working relationship with them. The Cypress College response is the same as above. As far as details, Cypress College partners with multiple state and local agencies to support their students who need services not provided by their own health services either through direct or indirect referrals.
2. The grant for Hunger Free Campus Program: Who is overseeing the distribution of these grant funds? What criteria is being used? I notice that the item is for "other operating expenses" is this a new grant from the State? **These funds are being administered by the campus personnel at Cypress College, Fullerton College and NOCE, similar to the 17-18 initial funding distributed for this same purpose. The additional funding for 18-19 requires the colleges to facilitate the following activities: (1) Designating campus employees to help ensure that students have the information they need to enroll in CalFresh and (2) Hosting a food pantry or regular food distributions on campus. The campus may partner with a local food bank or food pantry to support this activity.**
- At Fullerton College, the Dean, Student Support Services, Dr. Elaine Lipiz Gonzalez, oversees the Hunger Free Campus funds and the criteria come from AB453. Funds can be used to support a food pantry/food bank on campus or regular food distributions on campus.
 - At NOCE, under the direction of the Campus Communications Director, a portion of the grant was used to promote enrollment into Cal Fresh and provide nutritional snacks to the attendees. NOCE hopes to use the rest as a contribution to the operation of the District food pantries.
 - Dr. Richard Rams (Dean of Student Support Services) and Dave Okawa (Student Activities Director) oversee the Hunger Free funds. Cypress College uses its Hunger Free funding to provide staffing support and food, and the food bank is now providing grab and go breakfast to all students, including NOCE students. Oatmeal, cereal, granola bars, coffee, and tea is provided for all students, along with the usual food bank items. At one Opening Day event all faculty were provided with a *Buen Cypress* grocery bag to use to bring food to the campus food bank regularly. All students are also provided with this free bag and the College is currently working with Second Harvest to provide fresh food more regularly.

Yes, this is a new grant. The budget has been placed into a single line, "other operating expenses," for purposes of keeping the approval and input of these adjustments and initial entry of these funds as simple as possible and easy to identify in our system. Subsequent to Board approval, each program manager will be realigning the budget with their approved program plan.

Item 4.a, Cypress College:

1. Which school district or school is interested in offering Mandarin to their students? **As part of the Dual Enrollment Program, Cypress College has been offering Mandarin at Oxford Academy (part of AUHSD) since Fall 2018. In the Fall Cypress College offered Chinese 101, and in Spring 2019 they are offering Chinese 102. In Fall 2019 Cypress**

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College is planning to offer two classes at Oxford Academy, Chinese 101 and Chinese 203, this time in online hybrid formats (50 percent face-to-face and 50 percent online). Cypress College is one of only 12 community colleges in the State to offer Mandarin, and the only college in Orange County.

Item 5.d, Hourly Personnel:

1. May I have some context on Daishaun Hamblin's work with Raymond Elementary? **Daishaun Hamblin is a financial aid federal work study student working as a tutor at Raymond Elementary. NOCCCD has established that Fullerton School District is an eligible community service site for federal work study students. The "Federal Work Study Program Non-Exempt Off-Campus Agreement" was signed by Vice Chancellor Fred Williams on November 21, 2018.**
