Policy Guidelines for NOCCCD Master Planning

The over-arching statement used by Cal State Fullerton Campus Master Plan is as follows:

"Our blueprint for providing a safe, sustainable, welcoming and cohesive learning environment that supports student success into the future" is the foundational statement for the CSUF's Campus Master Plan which is currently being developed.

We are a teaching and learning institution and as such our buildings and grounds impart teaching through excellence in design and aesthetics, and an appreciation and preservation of our historic architecture.

Our built environments: buildings, landscapes, even our parking facilities are part of the educational experience. As such, they shall be designed to enhance that experience. As planning policies we support buildings that utilize sustainable materials, energy efficiency that is future oriented, capturing rain water from impervious surfaces, provide cross ventilation in addition to efficient heating and air conditioning, and capturing light in a variety of features.

We will honor campus landmarks, including buildings of historic importance, utilizing them to inform students, faculty and staff, so they in turn share this information with fellow students, visitors and residents of the larger community.

From the April 24th Minutes of 2019, "Trustee McClanahan requested that moving forward consideration be given to campus hardscape surface areas, impact of asphalt reflection and the shade to hardscape ratio for all parking lot projects."

Energy engineered solar solutions shall be pursued. Drought tolerant landscaping that is beautiful and conserves potable water shall be utilized.

Centennial Parking Structure (Fullerton College). What are the plans for including parking space availability by Jevel as part of the signage at the entrance? Is it possible to add the same feature for the parking structure on Lemon Street as a retro-fit?)

Performing Arts Complex (Fullerton College) Are there plans to do a "go see" of the Musco Center for the Arts at Chapman University? They used Yasuhisa Toyota of Nagata Acoustics of accommodate a variety of performances: music, theater, etc. Mark Swed, Music Critic for the Los Angeles Times, wrote an article on it. Also it was featured on LA Art on public television.

What educational principles have been enunciated to guide the revised Facilities Master Plan, e.g. interdisciplinary connections, flipped classrooms, etc.

Is it possible to bring the Hettebrink House back into the discussion? (Fullerton College).

What about long term consideration of utilizing the Berkeley site for pods of student housing: foster youth college students, veterans, international students, etc.?
