Review of Annual Audits – FY 2018-2019

The District followed the provisions of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements and Management Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments, and Statement No. 35, Basic Financial Statements and Management Discussion and Analysis of Public Colleges and Universities, and related amendments, following the Business Type Activity (BTA) model. This model provides a comprehensive view of the District, combining the funds of the District under the full accrual basis of accounting. In addition, the District has provided the required management discussion and analysis that outlines the financial highlights and explains, in narrative form, the financial information contained in the basic financial statements.

The audit also included an examination for compliance with laws and regulations as described in the California Community Colleges Contracted District Audit Manual.

<u>Audit Standards</u>: The financial and compliance audit was done in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and standards applicable to Financial Audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance), issued by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget; and standards issued by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office. The District received an unmodified ("clean") opinion on the audit, which means that the financial data was fairly stated, in all material respects, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

<u>Internal Control</u>: In conjunction with each financial and compliance audit of a community college district, the auditor conducts a study and evaluation of the community college district's system of internal accounting control and the systems established to ensure compliance with laws and regulations affecting the receipt and expenditure of state, federal, and local funds.

The audit included such testing as needed to generate the auditor's report on the study and evaluation of internal accounting control (including a description of material weaknesses) and systems established to ensure compliance with applicable laws and regulations. The audit noted no material weaknesses over either financial reporting or major federal programs.

<u>Compliance</u>: In addition to the auditor's reports and fiscal information presented in basic financial reviews, annual audits are required to report compliance aspects of significant state and federal programs. The audit noted no incidents of material weaknesses or significant deficiencies for either financial reporting or major federal programs.

<u>Findings:</u> The audit noted no current year findings and further noted that there were no prior year findings as well.

Other audits were performed on organizations closely associated with the District. The Proposition 39 Financial and Performance audit reports associated with the District's bond measures are also being submitted for review at this time. **SUBJECT**: Agreement with Porter Consulting, LLC.

**BACKGROUND**: On January 23, 2018, and extended on January 22, 2019, the Board approved a consulting agreement with Porter Consulting, LLC, to assist the campus with current and future work related to the New Science, Engineering, Mathematics (SEM) Building and the Veterans Resource Center/Student Activities (VRC) Building by providing staff to temporarily fulfill the Project Manager, Campus Capital Projects position.

The current agreement term ends on December 31, 2019. The original intent of this consultant hire was to be a temporary, full-time, Project Manager, Campus Capital Projects, until the permanent position was filled with a District employee. The college intends to retain Porter, LLC to work exclusively on the SEM/VRC projects therefore reducing the consultant position to 24 hours per week, but an additional six months is requested to fill the position, until June 30, 2020.

The consultant hourly rate will change to \$185 per hour.

The estimated cost for Porter Consulting, LLC is as follows:

The college intends to hire a permanent Project Manager, Campus Capital Projects, as we move into completing the remainder of the college's capital construction (Measure J, remaining budgeted projects total \$118 million) and other project management needs. Recruiting for this position is expected to commence in Spring 2020 or earlier.

This agenda item was submitted by Alexander Porter, Vice President, Administrative Services, Cypress College.

	Mindfulness and compassion practices invite the individual to develop mental training that help the individual to learn to focus attention. The individual engages in activities that build metacognitive awareness and notices with curiosity the thoughts and emotions that arise in one consciousness in order to be responsive rather than reactive. This is developed through an awareness of emotions arising, recurring thought patterns, focused attention, and physiological responses.										
	MIND 101 F includes a physiological realm. Mindfulness and compassion are embodied practices where the individual learns to develop interoceptive awareness, helping the individual to perceive subtle internal body signals. This interoceptive awareness is a fundamental aspect of mindfulness training. The neuroscience underlying mindfulness and compassion practices reinforce the concept of our beings as "integrated organisms with systemic functions" that do not operate in isolation.										
	MIND 101 F includes a societal realm. Mindfulness and compassion include both the intrapersonal and the interpersonal. One learns these practices so that one can take skillful and wise action in interpersonal relationships and in community with others. In this course, students are invited to reflect and analyze the relationship between the individual and society. ### AP 3500 Campus Safety

#### Reference:

Education Code Sections 212, 67380, and 87014; Penal Code Section 245; 20 U.S. Code Sections 1092(f) and 1232g; 34 Code of Federal Regulations 668.46 and 99.31(a)(13) and (14); Campus Security Act of 1990

- 1.0 Each campus shall provide, in a publication made generally available to students, information regarding the campus safety plan that describes the availability and location of security personnel, methods for summoning assistance of security personnel, and any special safeguards that have been established for particular facilities or activities.
- 2.0 The appropriate officials at each campus shall annually compile and update records of the following:
  - 2.1 All occurrences reported to campus safety personnel of, and arrests for, crimes that are committed on the campus and that involve violence, hate violence, theft or destruction of property, illegal drugs, or alcohol intoxication.
  - 2.2 All occurrences of noncriminal acts of hate violence, as defined in Education Code section 76380(a)(1)(B), reported to, and for which a written report is prepared by, designated campus authorities.
    - 2.2.1 A written report of hate violence shall include a description of the act of hate violence, victim characteristics, and offender characteristic, if known.
    - 2.2.2 The appropriate officials at each campus shall report information compiled relating to hate violence to the Board of Trustees.
  - 2.3 For purposes of reporting under the Clery Act, "hate crimes" include domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

## **AP 3501 Campus Security and Access**

- 1.0 During business hours, the District will be open to all individuals who have business on campus. During non-business hours access to all District facilities is by key, if issued, or by admittance via Campus Safety. In the case of periods of extended closing, the District will admit only those with prior written approval to all facilities.
- 2.0 Emergencies may necessitate changes or alterations to any posted schedules. Areas that are revealed as problematic will have regular periodic security surveys. Administrators review the survey results. These surveys examine security issues such as landscaping, locks, alarms, lighting, and communications. Additionally, during the year the appropriate administrators shall meet to discuss campus security and access issues of pressing concern.

1.0 In order to prevent discrimination on the basis of disability, the District will allow an individual with a disability to use a service animal in District facilities and on District campuses in compliance with state and federal law.

## **BP 3500 Campus Safety**

Reference:

**Education Code Section 67380 (a) (4)** 

1.0 The Board of Trustees is committed to a safe and secure work and learning environment within the District. To that end, the Chancellor shall establish a campus safety plan and ensure that it is posted or otherwise made available to students. The campus safety plan shall include availability and location of safety personnel, methods for summoning assistance of safety personnel, and special safeguards that have been established, any actions taken in the preceding 18 months to increase safety, and any changes in safety precautions to be made during the next 24 months.

### **BP 3505 Emergency Response Plan**

#### Reference:

Education Code Sections 32280 et seq. and 71095; Government Code Sections 3100 and 8607(a); Homeland Security Act of 2002; National Fire Protection Association 1600; Homeland Security Presidential Directive-5; Executive Order S-2-05; 19 California Code of Regulations Sections 2400-2450; 34 Code of Federal Regulations Part 668.46(g)

- 1.0 The District shall have emergency response and evacuation procedures for notifying the campus community in the event of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees occurring on the campus.
- 2.0 The Chancellor shall establish procedures that ensure that the District implements a plan to be activated in the event of an emergency or the occurrence of a natural disaster or hazardous condition. This plan must comply with the National Incident Management System (NIMS), the Standardized Emergency Management Systems (SEMS) and should incorporate the functions and principles of the Incident Command System (ICS), the Master Mutual Aid Agreement (MMAA), and any other relevant programs. The plan must incorporate NIMS and SEMS to facilitate the coordination between and among agencies in the event of an emergency or natural disaster.
- 3.0 Compliance with NIMS and SEMS mandates include but are not limited to:
  - 3.1 Establishing disaster preparedness procedures or a plan; and
  - 3.2 Completion of training sessions by college personnel in compliance with NIMS and SEMS guidelines.
    - 3.2.1 Training requirements vary based on job titles or assigned roles within the emergency plan.
- 4.0 College personnel must be informed that as public employees, they are also disaster service workers during national, state, and local emergencies. The District must ensure that its employees are in compliance with the disaster service worker oath requirements.
- 5.0 The Chancellor shall ensure that a team is created to carry out compliance with NIMS and SEMS mandates. The responses to emergencies or natural disasters are organized by SEMS into five categories: field response, local government, operational areas, regions, and state.
- 6.0 The plan shall contain information regarding activation and chain of command responsibilities. Compliance with NIMS mandates requires planning and incorporation for all phases of emergency management including mitigation and prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery. The District must ensure that its plan is updated regularly. Colleges must comply with NIMS and SEMS to receive federal or state funding.
