As provided by law, if a project will be carried out by a public agency, that agency is the lead agency for the project (14 Cal. Code Regs § 15051(a)).

BACKGROUND: The District is proposing to demolish the two residences and two garages remaining at 424-434-438 East Chapman Avenue & 400 Newell Place located within the City of Fullerton. The purpose of the proposed demolition is to have the site available for the District as a future instructional building with parking when funds become available. After the proposed demolition, the lot will remain vacant until the future instructional building and parking lot are constructed. Once constructed, the parking lot would require permits for students and/or staff. An environmental assessment of this property at the program level was included in the 2017 certified Facilities Master Plan Program Environmental Impact Report ("EIR") as the future location of an instructional building. At the time of the environmental assessment for the EIR, there were four residences located on the property. Since that time, the District has moved two of the residences (424 and 434 East Chapman Avenue) to another property to alleviate City of Fullerton and Local Historic Society historical concerns, leaving two remaining residences and garages (400 North Newell and 438 East Chapman Avenue) on the property. Because it was not contemplated in the Program EIR that the residences would be demolished well ahead of development of the site, the current action proposed has been evaluated and determined to be categorically exempt from CEQA.

The proposed demolition of the two residences and two garages on 424-434-438 East Chapman Avenue and 400 North Newell Place qualify as a "Class 1" Categorical Exemption, Existing Facilities, as outlined in Section 15320 (L) (1) of the CEQA Guidelines.

In 2015, GPA Consulting evaluated 428 East Chapman Avenue, 434 East Chapman Place, and 438 East Chapman Avenue, as well as 400 North Newell Place, to determine if the residences qualified as a historic resource(s) (GPA Consulting 2015). In 2017, Dudek also evaluated these properties, as well as those surrounding the site, as part of the analysis in the Cultural Resources Study for the Fullerton College Facilities Master Plan Program EIR (Dudek 2017) (Appendix C of the Program EIR). The findings of both assessments concluded that the residences were not eligible for listing in the National Register, California Register, or as a Fullerton Historical Landmark due to a lack of significance.

According to Dudek, the proposed action would not affect any buildings that are considered historically eligible. The proposed action qualifies as a "Class 1" Categorical Exemption under, *Existing Facilities*, as outlined in Section 15320 of the CEQA Guidelines.

As provided by law, if a project will be carried out by a public agency, that agency is the lead agency for the project (14 Cal. Code Regs § 15051(a)).

Per the opinions of Dudek and Cauvel & Dacey, P.C., the proposed action qualifies as a "Class 1" Categorical Exemption under, *Existing Facilities*, § 15320 (L) (1) of the CEQA Guidelines.

SUBJECT: Updates Fullerton College Building Design

Standards

BACKGROUND: On May 26, 2015, the Board adopted Resolution No. 14/15-12 to designate District Standard Materials and Equipment. In the resolution, the Vice Chancellor, Finance and Facilities, was authorized without further action or authority of the Board of Trustees to amend from time-to-time, the materials and/or equipment included in the Building Design Standards as necessary or appropriate.

As a result of the design and construction process at Fullerton College for the first Measure J funded projects using the adopted District-wide standards, a number of campus-specific materials and practices were identified that, if defined clearly in design standards, could significantly streamline the design, review, and planning process for campus staff and vendors while also ensuring a completed building constructed in alignment with Fullerton College maintenance best practices, inventories, and training.

The District retained the services of Westberg + White Architects and their group of consultants to work with campus users to review the existing standards in identified, high priority areas and incorporate the additional detail required in order to provide clear guidance to design teams. Priority Areas are identified below:

- Architectural Massing & Design
- Wayfinding & Signage Standards
- Parking Structure Standards
- Restroom & Janitorial Room Layout
- Landscape/Exterior Improvements
- Openings/Finishes
- Plumbing
- Mechanical
- Electrical
- Building Information Modeling Requirements

Westberg + White Architects also incorporated guidelines for fire, security, and access as developed by Security and Fire consultant Guideposts, into the master document.

After a lengthy process, an updated, campus-specific set of design guidelines based on District Standards has been compiled. The compilation continues to be a living document that will be reviewed and updated as needed. The document provides the Architect, Electrical Engineer, HVAC Consultant, and Civil Consultant the basic requirements and standards while also directing them to complementary District-wide documentation as appropriate (i.e. District Cabling Infrastructure Standards).

BACKGROUND: On April 24, 2018, the Board awarded a contract to Sodexo America LLC to manage and operate the food service facilities and catering at Fullerton College. Sodexo is contractually obligated to pay the college a minimum of \$60,000 in commission if sales were below \$1,900,000. Due to COVID-19, the Fullerton College campus closed indefinitely on March 16, 2020 and plans to remain closed through the Spring 2021 semester. The closure included Fullerton's dining facilities. Due to these extraordinary circumstances Sodexo will not incur any sales in the fiscal year 2020-2021. In honoring the continuance of Sodexo and Fullerton College's successful working relationship, it would be prudent for Fullerton College to recommend waiving the 2020-2021 commission of \$60,000 as a good faith gesture.

SUBJECT: Fullerton College Exclusive Beverage

Services Contract and Sponsorship with

Pepsi-Cola

BACKGROUND: Fullerton College began the exploration of having an exclusive beverage agreement during 2018. As part of that process the campus requested proposals from Coca-Cola and Pepsi-Cola. After analyzing both proposals and discussing the benefits with all campus constituents, Fullerton College initially recommended Coca-Cola and on November 12, 2019 the board approved the exclusive beverage provider to Coca-Cola. During the contract development process, we received additional guidance from District Counsel that a formal request for proposals (RFP) should have been completed. As a result, Fullerton College subsequently issued and advertised an RFP. Two RFP's were received, one from Coca-Cola and one from Pepsi-Cola. Based on the analysis of both tangible and intangible benefits, Fullerton College is recommending Pepsi-Cola as the exclusive beverage provider, and is requesting approval to enter into a contract with Pepsi-Cola, who offered the following contributions:

Pepsi-Cola demonstrated a strong commitment to advance student engagement, a very robust sustainability program, and a desire to collaborate on student life priorities. The Pepsi-Cola proposal included direct strategies to align with equity objectives, sustainability efforts, cultural programming, student leadership, athletics, and the robust student engagement activities at Fullerton College. In addition, Pepsi-Cola's proposal was \$30,000+ more per year in sponsorships to Fullerton College. Fullerton College recommends entering into a contract with Pepsi-Cola for five years, with an option for an additional five-year extension upon board approval. The contract will begin on June 1, 2021, which could be postponed pending COVID-19 conditions, and will run for a five-year period.

SUBJECT:	Agreement with Orange County Transit			

Authority (OCTA)

BACKGROUND: Cypress College Associated Students included an OCTA Bus Fee Referendum on their Spring 2020 Special Election ballot that was passed by a vote of 127 to 1. For a fee of \$2.50 per full-time student each semester and \$1.50 per part-time student each semester, the approved OCTA Bus Pass Fee Referendum allows all students to have unlimited fixed-route bus rides through the OCTA bus networks at no additional cost beyond the student fee.

The OCTA Bus Fee Program would primarily benefit low-income students and students with unreliable transportation, though all currently enrolled Cypress College students would have access to the service. Additional benefits include lowered impact to the environment by reducing fossil fuel emissions. Further, reduced traffic congestion due to increased use of public transportation is an added benefit to the community. Increased use of public transportation will also create more parking spaces for students with vehicles and alleviate campus congestion.

This Board agenda item is being submitted by Dr. Paul de Dios, Vice President, Student Services and Dr. Richard Rams, Dean of Student Support Services, Kinesiology & Athletics.

The student fees, \$2.50 per term for full-time students and \$1.50 for part-time students, would be assessed during the following two years starting in Spring 2022 and ending in Spring 2024 and are estimated at \$60,000 annually (calculated at 15,000 FTES x \$2.50 per semester = $$30,000 \times 2 \text{ terms} = $60,000 \text{ per year}$).

BACKGROUND: Historically, the North Orange County Community College District has maintained memberships in state and national organizations that represent and serve the interests of community colleges. Each year, the District pays the membership dues for these organizations, many of which are oriented toward a specific instructional area or toward the instructional program in general. Many of them are required or strongly recommended as part of an accreditation, while others provide professional development to staff or establish linkages between the District and the business or private sector. The Board has delegated the approval process for memberships under \$1,000; consequently, items presented for approval are those memberships that exceed \$1,000.

The inaugural #RealCollege California was implemented by the Chief Executive Officers of the California Community Colleges Affordability, Food & Housing Access Taskforce. Members of #RealCollege California receive the following support from the Hope Center for College, Community, and Justice:

- #RealCollege California Conference special membership rates for the annual conference and support with the planning and implementation of the conference which is held on a Californian Community College campus
- Strategic Planning advice from leaders, and help with strategic planning and implementation in diverse areas such as financial aid, food, housing, partnership relations, and advising
- Network and Partnership Connections networking opportunities and support provided by experienced practitioners from around the country
- Grant Assistance assistance with grant proposals and other fundraising activities
- Research, Data and Baseline Metrics assistance from qualified researchers to establish baseline metrics and assess outcomes as well as assistance with powerful story telling
- Online Resources participation in an online platform to communicate with colleagues for brainstorming, collaboration, planning, and a virtual book club
- Advocacy Support strategic guidance on policy advocacy at the state and federal levels
- #RealCollege Survey optional participation in the #RealCollege Survey, cost includes student incentives

This #RealCollege California membership will provide valuable information, data, and support related to addressing the food and housing insecurities facing many of our students. While the membership will impact the College as a whole, the membership

benefits will also support specific Student Services areas that work with students experiencing significant financial need such as the Student Food Pantry, Financial Aid, Veterans Resource Center, and the EOPS/CARE/CalWORKs at a cost not to exceed \$4,000.

SUBJECT:	Negotiated Tentative Agreement Between United Faculty CTA/CCA/NEA and the District		

## **BACKGROUND:**

United Faculty CTA/CCA/NEA and the District have negotiated a Tentative Agreement for the 2018-2019, 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 academic years. The Agreement provides for an on schedule salary increase of five and one half percent (5.5%) effective January 2021 and a one time off schedule payment in the amount of \$10,000.00. The District will provide a contribution up to \$8,058.00 annually towards dependent care medical premiums.

The Agreement contains modification to Articles 1, 5, 6, 7, 20 and 21. Additionally, the Agreement includes a Supplemental Early Retirement Program (SERP) and two collaborative workgroups. Effective July 1, 2021, the vesting for retiree medical benefits will change to fifty (50) years of District service.

The United Faculty membership has ratified the Agreement.

How does this relate to the five District Strategic Directions? NOCCCD will provide an inclusive, equitable, and welcoming environment to support the well-being and professional growth of all employees.

**How does this relate to Board Policy**: This item relates to Board Policy 7130, Compensation, which states the Board will establish salary and benefits for employees.

**FUNDING SOURCE AND FINANCIAL IMPACT**: Implementation of the salary increase (\$1,560,585), one-time off schedule payment (\$5,750,000) and health benefit dependent care premiums (\$652,698) for faculty for 2020-21 will be covered from budget transfers from campus contingencies and District one-time funds.

**RECOMMENDATION**: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the negotiated Tentative Agreement for 2018-2019, 2019-2020 and 2020-2021, inclusive of all terms and conditions specified in the written Agreement between United Faculty CTA/CCA/NEA and the District, be approved as follows:

## ADJUSTMENT FOR THE 2020-2021 FISCAL YEAR

The Regular and Contract Faculty (Instructor and Librarian 177 Days) Annual Salary Schedule, Regular and Contract Faculty (Counselor 195 Days) Annual Salary Schedule, Overload Teaching Hourly Salary Schedule, Overload Non-Teaching Hourly Salary Schedule, and Summer Intersession Schedule will be increased by five and one half percent (5.5%) across the schedules, effective January 2021.

Unit members will be provided a one-time off schedule payment in the amount of \$10,000. This amount will be paid in two increments: \$5,000 to be paid on January 29, 2021 payroll and \$5,000 to be paid on February 26, 2021 payroll.

Eligible unit members will provided a contribution up to \$8,058.00 annually towards dependent care medical premiums.

## AMENDMENT TO THE COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT

The Agreement also provides for modifications to Articles 1, 5, 6, 7, 20 and 21; Supplemental Early Retirement Program (SERP); and two collaborative workgroups. Effective July 1 2021, the vesting for retiree medical benefits will be fifty (50) years of District service.

It is further recommended that the attached Annual Salary Schedules for Regular and Contract Faculty (Instructor and Librarian 177 Days), Regular and Contract Faculty (Counselor 195 Days), Overload Teaching Hourly, Overload Non-Teaching Hourly, and Summer Intersession, which reflect five and one half percent (5.5%) increase effective January 2021, be approved.

# TENTATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE NORTH ORANGE COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT AND THE UNITED FACULTY/CCA/CTA/NEA

## December 1, 2020

This Tentative Agreement is entered into by and between the North Orange County Community College District ("NOCCCD") and United Faculty/CCA/CTA/NEA ("United Faculty"). NOCCCD and United Faculty may be referred to herein as "Party" or collectively as "Parties."

Any issue, subject, or matter discussed by the District and the United Faculty during negotiations over the 2018-2019, 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 bargaining proposals not contained in this document shall be considered withdrawn by the party presenting it. Any "oral agreement" or "understanding" not reflected in writing herein shall have no force or effect.

The parties agree that all articles of the prior agreement not addressed herein shall remain in full force and effect.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

The provisions of this Agreement, if ratified by the United Faculty membership and adopted by the Board of Trustees, shall constitute the complete and final settlement and obligation of the parties with respect to negotiations for the 2018-2019, 2019-2020 and 2020-2021. However, in the Spring of 2021, taskforces regarding Lecture/Laboratory Parity and 75th Percentile Comparability, shall commence. Should the taskforces have mutually agreed upon recommendations before the end of Spring 2022, the parties can reopen negotiations on the subject.

## **ARTICLE 1 – AGREEMENT**

Article 1: AGREEMENT, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendment(s):

## 1.5 TERMS OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall become effective upon full ratification and continue in effect to and including June 30, 2021, and from year to year thereafter unless alteration or amendment is requested in writing in accordance with section 1.3 of this Article.

## ARTICLE 5 - INSTRUCTOR WORKLOAD

Article 5: INSTRUCTOR WORKLOAD, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendment(s):

## 5.4 SCHEDULING

5.4.1 The regular contract for instructors shall be 175 177 days each academic year to be assigned within the regular semesters/trimesters and as otherwise specified in the academic calendar as negotiated by the District and the Association.

## ARTICLE 6 – COUNSELOR WORKLOAD

Article 6: COUNSELOR WORKLOAD, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendment(s):

## 6.1 REGULAR CONTRACT

The regular contract for counselors shall be 193 195 days each academic year, to be assigned between July 1 and the following June 30. The annual regular contract workload shall comprise a total of 1235 1245 hours to be assigned as provided in section 6.3.

## ARTICLE 7 – LIBRARIAN WORKLOAD

Article 7: LIBRARIAN WORKLOAD, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendment(s):

## 7.1 REGULAR CONTRACT

The regular contract for librarians shall be  $\frac{175}{177}$  days each academic year. The annual regular contract workload shall comprise a total of  $\frac{1224}{1234}$  hours to be assigned as provided in section 7.3. Librarians may work up to 60 hours total (30 hours per semester) of the  $\frac{1224}{1234}$  hour regular contract workload during the week preceding each regular semester. Any scheduling of librarian hours outside of the regular semesters shall be by mutual agreement between the Immediate Management Supervisor and the librarian.

## **ARTICLE 20 – SALARY PROVISIONS**

ARTICLE 20- Salary Provisions, shall remain unchanged except for the following amendment(s):

## 2020-2021 FISCAL YEAR

The Regular and Contract Faculty (Instructor and Librarian 177 Days) Annual Salary Schedule, Regular and Contract Faculty (Counselor 195 Days) Annual Salary Schedule, Overload Teaching Hourly Salary Schedule, Overload Non-Teaching Hourly Salary Schedule, and Summer Intersession Schedule will be increased by <u>five and one half percent (5.5%) across the schedules effective after ratification as outlined below:</u>

If this Tentative Agreement is ratified by UF and Board approved by December 15, 2020, the salary increase will be effective January 1, 2021 and paid on January 29, 2021 payroll. Unit members will be provided a one-time off schedule salary payment in the amount of \$10,000.

This amount will be paid in two increments: \$5,000 to be paid on January 29, 2021 payroll and \$5,000 to be paid on February 26, 2021 payroll.

If this Tentative Agreement is ratified by UF and Board approved by January 26, 2021, the salary increase will be effective February 1, 2021 and paid on February 26, 2021 payroll. Unit members will be provided a one-time off schedule salary payment in the amount of \$10,000. This amount will be paid in two increments: \$5,000 to be paid on February 26, 2021 payroll and \$5,000 to be paid on March 31, 2021 payroll.

One-time off schedule salary payment shall not apply to any UF Unit Member who was terminated, who resigned his/her employment with the District, or who resigned his/her employment with the District pursuant to any compromise and release settlement agreement prior to the date of this Agreement and formally approved by the Board of Trustees.

## **ARTICLE 21 – EMPLOYEE BENEFITS**

Article 21: EMPLOYEE BENEFITS shall remain unchanged except for the following amendment(s):

## 21.1 HOSPITALIZATION AND MEDICAL CARE PLAN

- 21.1.1 The District is currently a participating agency in the CalPERS Hospital and Medical Care plan which allows eligible Unit Members to select from several plans for their hospitalization and medical care.
- 21.1.2 The District will pay the full cost of the employee-only premium for eligible Unit Members employed fifty (50) percent or more. Effective January 1, 2021 and implemented in February 2021, an adjusted amount for dependent care medical premiums will be provided to eligible Unit Members who currently pay out of pocket premiums for the remaining months of 2020-2021. Effective July 1, 2021, the District will contribute a maximum up to \$8,058.00 annually towards dependent care medical premiums. Any additional premiums for dependent medical will be paid by the unit member by automatic payroll deductions in accordance with established District payroll procedure. This contribution is separate and distinct from the fringe benefit allowance.
- 21.1.3 An eligible Unit Member who elects not to participate in the District's hospitalization and medical care plan will receive an addition of three hundred (300) dollars to the annual discretionary fringe benefit allowance.

## 21.2 DISCRETIONARY FRINGE BENEFIT ALLOWANCE

- 21.2.1 The District will provide an annual discretionary fringe benefit allowance, in the amount negotiated by the parties (the current rate is \$4646.10) to eligible Unit Members. The amount of the allowance shall be prorated based on the Unit Member's percentage of employment.
- 21.2.2 The discretionary fringe benefit allowance may be allocated to District approved deferred

compensation investment option plans and, except with respect to domestic partner coverage as provided in section 21.4 of this Article, toward the premium cost of the following optional benefits.

- 21.2.2.1 Hospitalization and medical care plan for dependents of the Unit Member;
- 21.2.2.2 Dental and vision insurance for the Unit Member and /or dependents;
- 21.2.2.3 Life insurance for the Unit Member and/or dependents;
- 21.2.2.4 Accident insurance for the Unit Member and/or dependents;
- 21.2.2.5 Income protection insurance for the Unit Member.
- 21.2.2 Effective January 1, 2016, The fringe benefit allowance for eligible Unit Members will be paid as compensation. This allowance may be allocated towards the NOCCCD Section 125 Plan and/or a qualified tax sheltered annuity. The fringe benefit allowance may be allocated toward the premium cost(s) of optional benefits for any District approved vendor.
- 21.2.3 The total cost of the Unit Member's benefit choice(s) exceeding the Unit Member's own medical premium. If the total cost of deferred compensation and optional benefits selected by the Unit Member exceeds the available discretionary fringe benefit allowance amount, the cost in excess of the allowance amount will be deducted from the Unit Member's paycheck in accordance with established District payroll procedure. If the total cost of deferred compensation and optional benefits selected by the Unit Member is less than the discretionary fringe benefit allowance amount, the unallocated allowance amount will be deposited in the deferred compensation investment plan option selected by the employee.
- 21.2.4 Selection of a 403(b) or 457 investment plan option must be from the list of approved District vendors. Unit Members may contact the District's Third Party Administrator, for options and enrollment documents. The District's designated Third Party Administrator must be provided with written notice of the selection. Unit Members are responsible for contacting the investment company and completing the necessary paperwork to establish an account.
- 21.2.5 New Unit Members must select an eligible deferred compensation investment plan option and establish an account within ninety (90) calendar days from the first day of paid service to provide for the deposit of any unallocated fringe benefit allowance amounts. In the event the Unit Member does not establish an account by the prescribed deadline, the District shall have the authority to establish, through the 457(b) Deferred Compensation Plan sponsored by the District with School's First Federal Credit Union, a Share Certificate account in the name of the employee to provide for the deposit of unallocated fringe benefit allowance amounts.

#### 21.3 RETIREE BENEFITS

- 21.3.1 Unit Members who were hired by the District prior to May 1, 1994 July 1, 1993, shall be entitled to District-paid post-retirement medical benefits if the Unit Member has fulfilled the requirements to receive a retirement benefit under the State Teachers Retirement System or the Public Employees Retirement System and retires within 120 days of separating from the District.
- 21.3.2 Unit Members hired by the District on or after May 1, 1994 July 1, 1993, shall be entitled to District-paid post-retirement medical benefits if the Unit Member:
  - 21.3.2.1 has been employed full-time, one-hundred (100) percent by the District with a minimum of fifteen (15) years of <u>District</u> credited service; or
  - 21.3.2.2 is an eligible part-time Unit Member, employed less than one hundred (100) percent, who qualifies for District-maintained contributions for employee health plan premiums and retires from the District with District service accumulated pro-rata equivalent to one-hundred (100 percent employment at fifteen (15) years, or twenty (20) years of District credited service, whichever is sooner.
  - 21.3.2.3 Unit Members who qualify for disability retirement under the State Teachers Retirement System or the Public Employees Retirement System shall qualify for one-hundred (100) percent District-paid post-retirement medical benefits as if they had qualified under the provisions of section 21.3.1 or 21.3.2.
- 21.3.3 Unit Members hired by the District to begin work on or after July 1, 2021, shall be entitled to District-paid post-retirement medical benefits if the Unit Member:
  - 21.3.3.1 has been employed by the District and retires with a minimum of fifty (50) years of District credited service or
  - 21.3.3.2 Unit Members who qualify for disability retirement under the State Teachers

    Retirement System or the Public Employees Retirement System shall qualify for one-hundred (100) percent District-paid post-retirement medical benefits as if they had qualified under the provisions of section 21.3.1.
- 21.3.4 For the purpose of application with respect to the provisions of sections 21.3.2.1 and 21.3.2.2, or sections 21.3.3.1 and 21.3.3.2 the employment of the Unit Members who participate in the Reduced Workload Program as provided in Article 19 of this Agreement is part-time employment. Credit toward the fifteen-year or fifty-year service requirement will be accumulated on a proportionate basis, prorated by the annual percentage of employment for each year of participation in the Reduced Workload Program.
- 21.3.5 Additionally, subject to the provisions of the California Government Code and CalPERS regulations this plan pays the premium for the hospitalization and medical care plan for

a spouse who becomes an annuitant of the Public Employees Retirement System or the State Teachers Retirement System as a result of the death of the retiree. For purposes of this section, "spouse" includes the domestic partner of an annuitant as defined by section 297 of the California Family Code.

21.3.6 The Insurance and Benefits Committee will resume meeting in Spring 2021 to research and analyze retiree benefit options for all groups and make recommendations for negotiations for faculty hired after July 1, 2021.

## SUPPLEMENTAL EARLY RETIREMENT PROGRAM

Supplemental Early Retirement Program (SERP) will be offered to eligible unit members with five (5) or more years of service credit with the North Orange County Community College District. Eligible unit member must provide the District a written notice of retirement date after April 15, 2021 and prior to June 30, 2021. The SERP will provide the eligible unit member the amount of \$1,000.00 per year of service up to a maximum dollar amount of \$25,000 with annuity options.

## **COLLABORATIVE WORKGROUPS**

The parties will form two taskforces to analyze Lecture/Laboratory Parity and 75th Percentile Total Compensation Comparability. Should the taskforces have mutually agreed upon recommendations before the end of Spring 2022, the parties can reopen negotiations on the subject.

<u>During the Spring 2021 semester, a Lecture/Laboratory Parity workgroup will be formed to provide mutually agreed upon recommendations for procedures, guidelines, and Lecture/Laboratory ratio compensation as agreed to in the MOU dated May 2016.</u>

<u>During the Spring 2021 semester, the 75th Percentile workgroup will be formed to provide recommendations of the community college districts and benchmarks for 75th Percentile Total Compensation Comparability as agreed to in the MOU dated December 2013.</u>

## MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE NORTH ORANGE COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

November 24, 2020

The Board of Trustees of the North Orange County Community College District met for its Regular Meeting on Tuesday, November 24, 2020, at 5:30 p.m. via Zoom teleconference and YouTube livestream.

President Ryan Bent called the meeting to order at 5:32 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

**TRUSTEE ROLL CALL**: <u>Present</u>: Ryan Bent, Stephen T. Blount, Jeffrey P. Brown, Barbara Dunsheath, Ed Lopez, Jacqueline Rodarte, and Student Trustee Chloe Reyes. Student Trustee Ester Plavdjian joined the meeting at 7:58 p.m. <u>Absent</u>: None.

RESOURCE PERSONNEL PRESENT: Cheryl Marshall, Chancellor; Fred Williams, Vice Chancellor, Finance & Facilities; Irma Ramos, Vice Chancellor, Human Resources; Cherry Li-Bugg, Vice Chancellor, Educational Services & Technology; Greg Schulz, President, Fullerton College; JoAnna Schilling, President, Cypress College; Valentina Purtell, President, North Orange Continuing Education; Ty Volcy, representing the District Management Association; Jennifer Oo, representing the North Orange Continuing Education Academic Senate; Craig Goralski, representing the Cypress College Academic Senate; Kim Orlijan, representing the Fullerton College Faculty Senate; Christie Diep, representing United Faculty; Dawnmarie Neate representing CSEA; Lauren Mata representing Adjunct Faculty United; and Alba Recinos, Recording Secretary.

## **COMMENTS**

- A. **Fred Williams** reported that the next Citizens' Oversight Committee meeting is scheduled for December 2 at 4:00 p.m. and a Districtwide Budget Allocation Model webinar will take place on December 10 at 2:30 p.m. Information for both events can be found on the District website.
- B. **Valentina Purtell** reported on NOCE Spring semester preparations that include finalizing the class schedule, curriculum development, and the online teaching certification for faculty. Student support services will continue to include the laptop loan program, drive-up Wi-Fi, food distribution events, the Emergency Aid Program, online counseling, and a virtual career resource center. President Purtell expressed her gratitude for NOCE students, faculty, staff, and District colleagues and wished everyone a happy Thanksgiving.
- C. JoAnna Schilling thanked Trustee Barbara Dunsheath for her presentation on women's right to vote to the Soroptimist Club. She shared that Dawn Decker received the 2020 CAPED President's Award, Maha Afra was recognized as the CAPED Teacher of the Year and three Cypress College students Joyce Lin, Ryan Chieng, and Traci Nguyen were accepted to present research papers at the Western Psychological Association Conference. Dr. Schilling invited everyone to attend the annual Cypress College Kwanza event on December 8 and expressed her gratitude for students and colleagues who persevered under enormous challenges this year.
- D. **Greg Schulz** reported that **Azin Biatani** and **Adam Zerue** received the Fall 2020 Classified Recognition Awards and shared that a student written article in The Hornet, "Fullerton College Athletic Trainers Pave the Way for Safe Sports Conditioning" was shared by the California Community College Athletic Association and received statewide and national coverage. Dr. Schulz concluded his report by sharing that the College's Thanksgiving Food Drive served over 300 families and wished a happy Thanksgiving to all.
- E. **Ty Volcy** reported that DMA is supporting student basic needs by donating \$500 to each campus food bank to assist their efforts and congratulated **Evangelina Rosales** on her election to the Board.
- F. **Jennifer Oo** called attention to the new NOCE Personal Aide Program that will be offered in the Spring semester and was developed collaboratively between the CTE and ESL departments. The program will work with industry to help students find employment upon completion.

G. **Craig Goralski** reported that the Cypress College Academic Senate decided to reconvene their COVID ad hoc committee which will continue to meet to develop recommendations. The Senate also received a first draft of the Black Lives Matter Task Force recommendations, voiced their support for the new AP 5041, Gender and Chosen Name, and voted to approve a letter of support for the Fullerton College Associated Students which Dr. Goralski read into the record.

- H. Kim Orlijan echoed President Schulz support for classified awardees Azin Biatani and Adam Zerue and reported that the Fullerton College Faculty Senate discussed the proposed academic calendars, opted to not support them, and would like to have calendars that support a robust winter intersession and keep the Spring Break in the middle of the semester.
- I. **Christie Diep** reported that the Spring COVID-19 MOU with the District was ratified by 95% of the vote and that United Faculty remains in full support of Associated Students.
- J. **Dawnmarie Neate** expressed her hope that things never go back to the way they were before: that the District can continue to provide accommodations at a moment's notice, that individuals continue to be activists, and that those in power will use their voice to support the marginalized. She stated that CSEA stands with Associated Students.
- K. Lauren Mata reported that Adjunct Faculty United hosted a "Know Your Contract" event for part-time faculty and that the Spring MOU negotiations with the District have concluded. She shared her thoughts on what it means to be a servant leader, the value the term has, the duty that leaders have to represent those they serve, and that leadership is an opportunity to serve.
- L. **Student Trustee Chloe Reyes** reported that with the semester coming to a close, students are preparing for their final exams. She wished everyone a safe and happy Thanksgiving holiday.
- M. **Trustee Ed Lopez** reported on his participation in the virtual CCLC Annual Convention which included sessions on diversity, equity, and inclusion and anti-racism. He shared that CCLC will be revising board policy templates in order to speak to those issues and expressed that he looked forward to seeing those revisions.
- N. Trustee Jeffrey P. Brown thanked Lauren Mata for her servant leadership remarks.
- O. **Trustee Barbara Dunsheath** encouraged attendance at the #RealCollegeCalifornia Basic Needs Summit on December 4 and reported on her participation in CCLC's first virtual convention. She noted that CCLC has a new caucus: the California Community College Women's Caucus, and she expressed hope that the District would join and be well represented.
- P. **Trustee Stephen T. Blount** extended his appreciation to the Fullerton College Fall 2020 Classified Recognition Awardees.
- Q. **Trustee Ryan Bent** also reported on his attendance at the CCLC Annual Convention and the online sessions he participated in.

Item 5.f: The Board received and reviewed the District's Institutional Commitment to Diversity Five Year Report 2015-16 through 2019-20. Arturo Ocampo, District Director, Equity and Compliance, conducted a presentation highlighting District applicant and new hire demographics for 2019-20, five-year applicant and new hire demographics for 2015-20, District comparative data, District employee demographics, faculty hiring trends, departments and categories with underrepresentation, and district-wide diversity activities. The following points were emphasized:

- 37% of applicants were White, but they made up 53% of hires.
- The majority of full-time faculty hires come from the adjunct ranks.
- The majority of management hires in 2019-20 were Latinx.
- 71% of classified applications were diverse.
- The diversity of applicant pools has increased from 42% to 67% and is most driven by classified hiring.

- Students are 71% diverse while employees are 50% diverse with the biggest discrepancy in the Latinx category.
- District employee diversity is 50% while the statewide average is 41% and 43% among local community college districts.
- Future service area growth will come from the Latinx populations.
- District diversity has increased by 9% over the last five years to 49%.
- Females make up a majority of District employees.
- Five-year faculty hiring trends reflect a 4.9% decrease in the White category, with increases in Latinx, Asian, and African-American.
- While the percentage of diverse applicants has increased by 22% over the last five years, the faculty hires have decreased 0.8% over that same time period.
- The decrease in full-time faculty diversity can be attributed to the higher rate of White faculty member retirements.

Mr. Ocampo recommended that the District commit to diverse adjunct faculty ranks since full-time faculty hires come from that pool, to allow classified employees to teach as adjuncts, to review applicant data to evaluate where and why diverse applicants are being screened out of the hiring process, and that departments where underrepresentation is found develop a plan to recruit, retain, and hire diverse faculty.

In the ensuing discussion, trustees inquired about a possible adverse impact analysis of the District's screening process, action taken by faculty to improve the data, applicant data for those initially screened out due to minimal qualifications, efforts to allow classified employees to teach, the availability of cited reports, and when the Board would be provided with a follow-up report to include concrete actions designed to affect changes.

District staff thanked Mr. Ocampo for providing the data which was quite surprising to many and encouraged more conversations to find out what is happening. Additional suggestions included spotlighting each instruction area to get to diverse staff on all levels, substantial reform in the adjunct faculty hiring process, having the EEO Representative work solely in that capacity on hiring committees, the importance of having data at the departmental level before and after the hiring process, analyzing why diverse applicants aren't advancing to the final interviews, and the need to work collaboratively to address the issue. Mr. Ocampo concluded the presentation by noting that there are creative methods to increase the diversity of hires that will require out-of-the-box thinking, but that small tweaks will not accomplish that.

## GENERAL

Item 6.a: It was moved by Trustee Barbara Dunsheath and seconded by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte that the Board establish Tuesday, December 15, 2020, as the date of its Organizational Meeting and to so inform the County Superintendent. The Board reviewed the suggested 2021 calendar of meetings and made no additional revisions to the schedule. Motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, and Rodarte voting yes, including Student Trustee Reyes' advisory vote.

**Item 6.b**: It was moved by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte and seconded by Trustee Jeffrey P. Brown that the Board adopt the following proposed, revised Board Policies:

- BP 2410, Board Policies and Administrative Procedures
- BP 2740, Board Education Professional Development.

During the discussion, clarification was provided regarding the language in Sections 1.1 and 1.2.1 in BP 2740, and it was agreed to remove "shared" from Section 1.2.1. **Motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, and Rodarte voting yes, including Student Trustee Reyes' advisory vote.** 

Once adopted by the Board, the revised policies will be placed on the District's website, where they will be readily accessible by students, employees, and the general public.

**Item 6.c**: It was moved by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte and seconded by Trustee Stephen T. Blount that the Board adopt new Administrative Procedure 5041, Gender and Chosen Name.

Subsequent to thanking everyone involved in creating the well-written administrative procedure, the motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, and Rodarte voting yes, including Student Trustee Reyes' advisory vote.

Once adopted by the Board, the new Administrative Procedure will be placed on the District's website, where it will be readily accessible by students, employees, and the general public.

**Item 6.d**: The Board reviewed the following revised Board Policies that were revised by the Board Policy Subcommittee and presented as an information item prior to being shared with the District Consultation Council:

- BP 2310, Regular Meetings of the Board
- BP 2715, Code of Ethics/Standards of Practice

Trustee Ed Lopez led a summary of the policy revisions and provided justification for the changes on behalf of the Board Policy Subcommittee which also included Trustees Ryan Bent and Jacqueline Rodarte.

In the ensuing discussion, the following revisions were recommended:

- BP 2310, Section 8 Change "governed by" to "guided by" in order to avoid unintended consequences.
- BP 2715, Section 1.2 Add language to the end of the sentence to address the specific Government Code Section.
- BP 2715, Section 1.6 Add a comma after "residents."
- BP 2715, Section 3.0 Add language to reflect that if resolution is reached by the Board President, that resolution will be reported out.
- BP 2715, Section 3.0 Add language to reflect that the ad hoc committee will be comprised of three trustees.
- BP 2715, Section 3.0 Revise the fourth sentence to read, "Sanctions, if any, will be determined by the Board of Trustees and may include censure, removal from a Board officer position, or other actions of less severity."
- BP 2715, Section 4.0 Revised to read, "Sanctions of censure or removal from a Board officer position shall require a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Board of Trustees. Less severe sanctions require a majority vote of the Board of Trustees."

- BP 2715, Section 4.0 Include the definition of censure ("Censure is an official expression of disapproval passed by the Board.") to the beginning of the section.
- BP 2715 Include the two ethics related documents provided by Trustee Dunsheath as reference documents at the end of the policy.

Clarification was also provided on why the subcommittee: 1) added the use of a District email account for District business (to distinguish from personal business, promote transparency, and as good practice); 2) made revisions to Sections 1.7 and 1.10 that removed stronger language (because individual trustees cannot ensure the actions listed); and 3) recommended a 12-month period to file a complaint (guided by the general statute of limitations and the desire to include a period that was short enough to ensure memories were fresh, but long enough to not appear that complaints were being cut off). After discussing a 3-month or 6-month time period, it was determined that it would be best to defer to the campus review process for guidance on the specific time period.

These items will be shared with the District Consultation Council before returning to the Board for a first and second reading.

**Item 6.e**: It was moved by Trustee Jacqueline Rodarte and seconded by Trustee Stephen T. Blount that the Board acknowledge receipt of the two formal complaints regarding Board President Ryan Bent and create an ad hoc committee to investigate the allegations as outlined in Board Policy 2715.

Board Vice President Barbara Dunsheath led the discussion where it was determined that the ad hoc committee will be comprised of Trustees Stephen T. Blount, Barbara Dunsheath, and Jacqueline Rodarte. It was noted that the complaints request actions that are not within the purview of the Board and stressed that there are limitations as to what is actually possible.

Subsequent to the discussion, the motion carried with Trustees Bent, Blount, Brown, Dunsheath, Lopez, and Rodarte voting yes, including Student Trustees Reyes and Plavdjian's advisory votes.

**Item 6.f**: Board President Ryan Bent asked if there were any requests for potential future Board agenda items and there were none.
