No matter what the verdict was today, at Cypress College we remain committed to our pursuit of racial justice, becoming an antiracist institution, and being unapologetic in our assurance that our campus community will care for and be there for our students and employees.

As Ibram Kendi stated, "there is no neutrality in the racism struggle...One either allows racial inequities to persevere, as a racist, or confronts racial inequities, as an antiracist. There is no in between safe space of 'not racist.' The claim of 'not racist' neutrality is a mask for racism." We are grateful for the work so many have done and continue to do at our campus to ensure this justice prevails today and every day.



**DEI Awareness Month:** April has been designated as Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Awareness Month for the California Community Colleges, and our NOCCCD Board of Trustees has adopted a resolution in support of it.
